

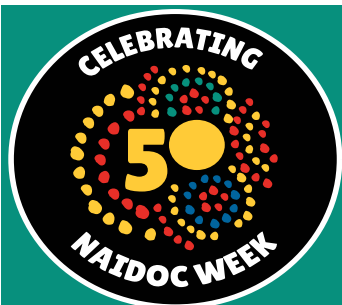

CWBA Statement Regarding Wild Dog Control on DBCA Managed Lands

DBCA has advised that permits authorising the Central Wheatbelt Biosecurity Association (CWBA) and Northern Biosecurity Group (NBG) to undertake wild dog control on affected DBCA managed lands ceased on 30 June 2026, following a decision by the Yamatji Nation Joint Management Body not to renew the permits.

The decision affects more than 340,000 hectares of DBCA managed land within and adjacent to the Shires of Dalwallinu, Morawa and Perenjori inside the State Barrier Fence. This includes **Karara Rangelands, Buntine Nature Reserve, Weelhamby Reserve, Bowgada Reserve, Jibberding UCL, Goorly Lakes UCL, Hollywell Road UCL** and several Unallocated Crown Land (UCL) timber reserves within the CWBA region, as well as **Barnong Nature Reserve** and the former **Barnong Pastoral Lease** in the NBG region, which borders properties in the Shire of Morawa.

CWBA is deeply concerned about the potential impacts of this decision and is actively engaging with DBCA, DPIRD, neighbouring Recognised Biosecurity Groups and other stakeholders to understand how effective wild dog management will be maintained on these lands into the future.

Under the Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007, all landholders and land managers have responsibilities for managing declared pests on land under their control. While CWBA supports coordinated landscape-scale pest management programs, these responsibilities remain with individual land managers.

There are currently no changes to CWBA coordinated wild dog control activities on private land. We will continue working with landholders, government agencies and other stakeholders to support effective wild dog management across the region.

CWBA encourages landholders to increase monitoring for signs of wild dog activity and ensure they hold current Restricted Pesticide Permits for the use of 1080, strychnine and leg hold traps so control measures can be implemented promptly if required.

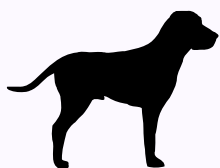

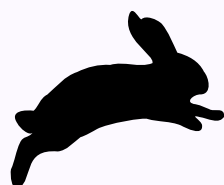

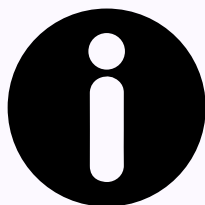

RoadWise Recognised

RoadWise Recognised acknowledges RoadWise Councils commitment to moving towards better practice in managing road safety performance on the local road network through awarding Points and Ribbons based on their local road safety action planned, implemented and/or evaluated

How it Works

Throughout the year, RoadWise Councils will be awarded Points for each road safety activity or intervention undertaken as per the RoadWise Framework. Points are allocated based on the

effectiveness, longevity and scale of the road safety activity and takes into account the capacity of the Local Government. An increase in Points over time indicates progress towards better road safety practices.

Annually, RoadWise Council's will be awarded Ribbons, highlighting their holistic approach to road safety, aligned to systems thinking. Ribbons will be awarded to a maximum of five and will re-set each year. To ensure this process is objective, equitable and transparent, a panel of independent specialists oversee the RoadWise Recognised initiative.

RoadWise Councils

There are 75 Local Governments registered as a RoadWise Council in WA. WALGA is proactively engaging, motivating and supporting these RoadWise Councils in adopting and applying policies and practices that make an effective and sustainable contribution to the achievements of national and state road safety objectives and targets.

Rain

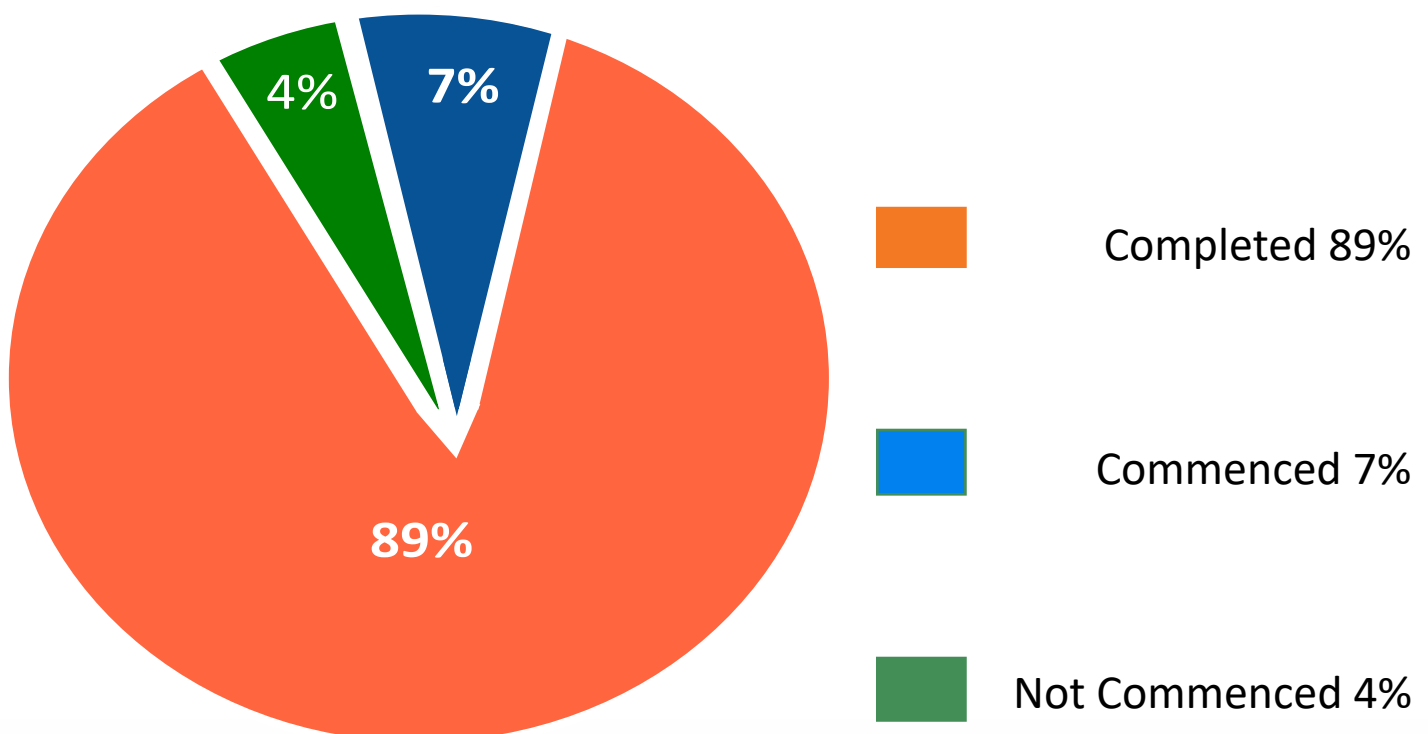

Census 2026 - Tuesday 11 August

From late July 2026, households will receive instructions on how to complete the Census. You can complete the Census as soon as you get your instructions, if you know where you'll be on Census night. Most households will get a letter with instructions to complete the Census online. If you get instructions to complete online but would prefer a paper form, you'll be able to request one.

Some points to remember about the Census Information collected

You need to complete the Census wherever you are staying on Census night.

If you're travelling in Australia on Census night, you still need to complete a Census form for wherever you are staying.

If someone is completing the Census form at your usual address, you'll need to be marked as 'away' but usually living at the dwelling.



Data collected in the Census matters

Data collected in the Census helps community organisations, businesses and governments make informed decisions. Government agencies reference Census results when assessing grant applications. The more correct the information, the more options become available to local governments. However, this is a direct result of correct information being collated.



Your information is safe.

Your personal information is private and protected by law. Private means the Australian Bureau of Statistics will not share your information with anyone. You can find out more about how they keep your information private on their website:

Every answer matters in the Census

The Census is the most comprehensive snapshot of the country and tells the story of how we are changing. The Census is the only data collection activity that provides information for the entire country, including for small geographic areas and small population groups. 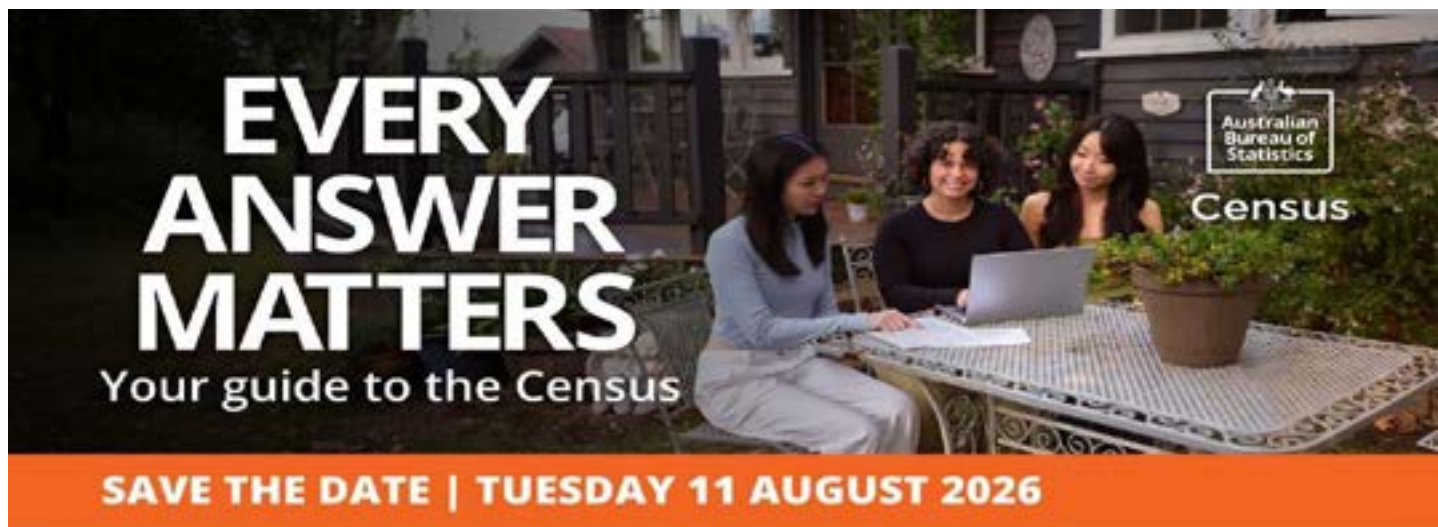

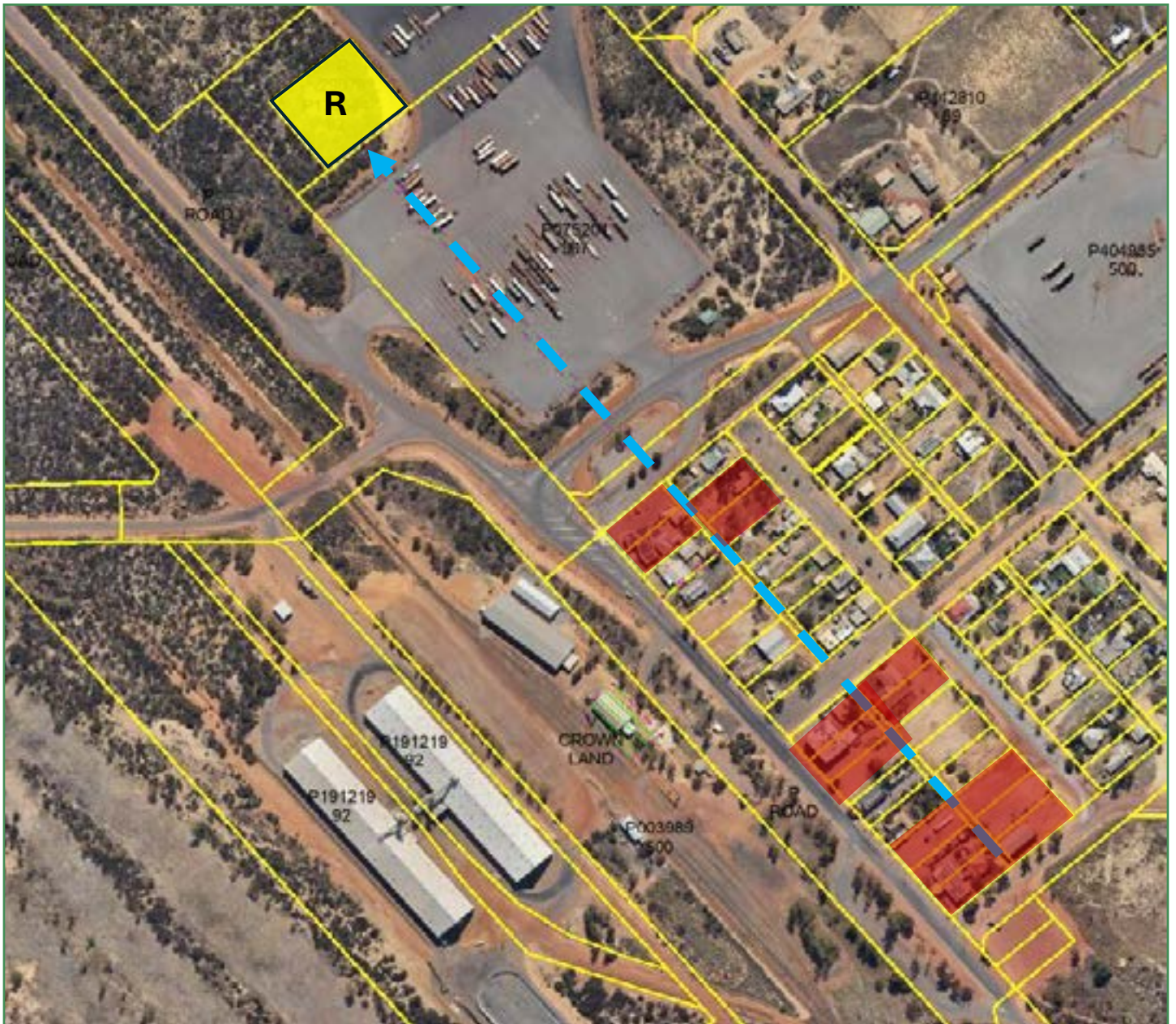

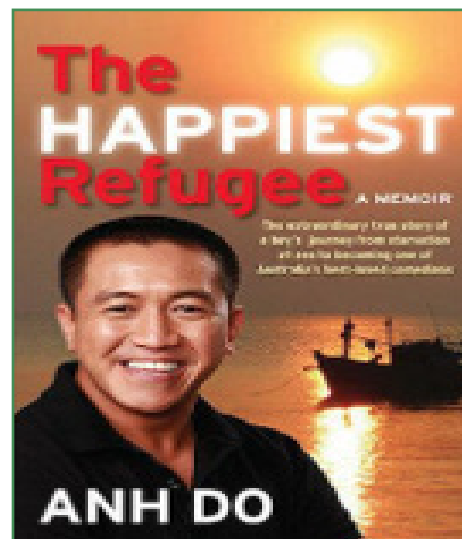
Anh Do - is an Australian author, actor, comedian, and painter.

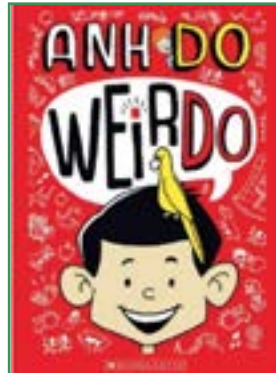
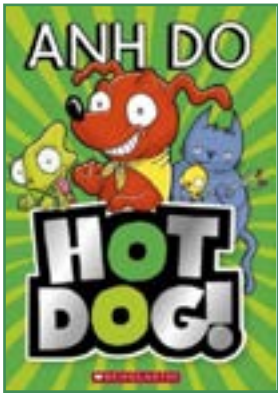

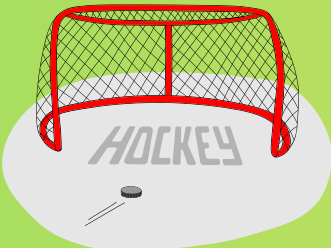

Why baby bottle self-feeding devices are now banned

In case you missed it, baby bottle self-feeding devices were permanently banned by the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) back in May.

Baby bottle self-feeding devices are designed to allow bubs to drink from a bottle without an adult holding it. Some use pillows or a body worn holder to prop up a bottle in the baby's mouth, while others use flexible tubes or straws that connect a teat to a bottle.

These devices have been linked to life-threatening risks of choking, suffocation or aspiration, which is when liquid enters the lungs instead of the stomach. An ACCC investigation found these were unacceptable safety risks.

As a parent or carer, you may think these self-feeding products make things easier, especially when you're busy juggling multiple tasks, but babies cannot safely manage feeding on their own. Unlike older children, babies cannot regulate the flow of milk or remove a bottle if they start to choke.

Another danger is the potential lack of active supervision. You could miss the important signs that your bub is in distress, such as gagging or discolouration of the lips, tongue or nose that may signal respiratory problems.

For parents and carers, the safe feeding advice is clear that babies should always be actively supervised, and bottles should never be propped up or left in a baby's mouth unattended.

If you own a baby bottle self-feeding device, you should stop using it immediately and dispose of it safely so it cannot be used by anyone else.

The ban also places legal obligations on businesses. It is now illegal to manufacture, advertise, sell, supply or offer to supply these products in Australia. Businesses that continue to sell banned products may face significant penalties.

Supplemental nursing systems used to support breastfeeding, or sippy cups and trainer cups designed for older infants and toddlers learning to drink independently are not affected by this ban.

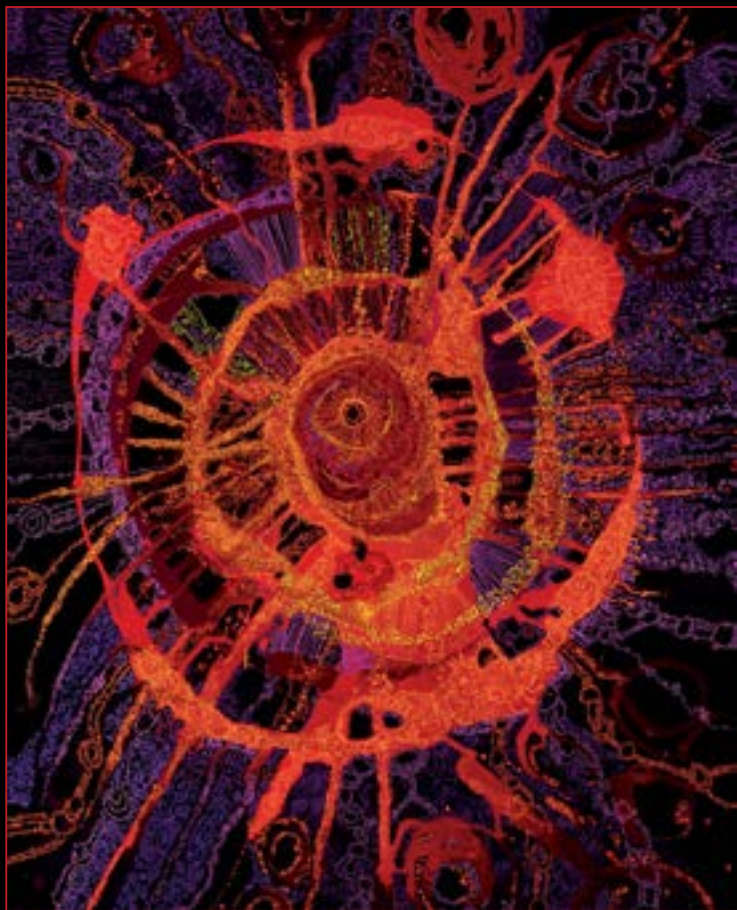

Paralpi by Zaachariaha Fielding

The 2026 National NAIDOC Week poster, *Paralpi* by acclaimed Yankunytjatjara artist and musician Zaachariaha Fielding, captures the spirit of this year's theme, "50 Years of Deadly".

The artwork reflects movement through generations, memory, song and story — honouring the strength of those who carried culture, community and resistance forward, while celebrating the next generation continuing that legacy today.

Rich in colour, symbolism and energy, *Paralpi* speaks to the enduring strength and cultural power of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples over the past fifty years of NAIDOC and beyond. The flowing forms throughout the work symbolise continuity and connection between Ancestors, community and future generations, representing culture as something living, evolving

and deeply connected to identity, language and Country.

The piece also reflects the cultural renaissance taking place across communities throughout the country — where language, music, art and storytelling continue to thrive in contemporary spaces while remaining grounded in ancient knowledge systems and cultural responsibility.

As NAIDOC marks fifty years as a national celebration, *Paralpi* honours both legacy and future. It is a celebration of Black excellence, resilience and creativity, while inviting all Australians to reflect on the richness and diversity of First Nations cultures.

Through this powerful work, Zaachariaha Fielding captures what NAIDOC has represented for generations: pride, survival, visibility and the ongoing strength of culture.

Zaachariaha Fielding is a proud Yankunytjatjara person from the APY Lands in South Australia and is recognised as one of Australia's leading contemporary First Nations artists and musicians.

Known internationally as one half of the acclaimed music duo Electric Fields, Zaachariaha's work brings together language, music, visual storytelling and culture in deeply powerful and contemporary ways. Through both his music and visual art practice, he celebrates the strength of First Nations identity, the continuation of culture and the importance of language and storytelling.

His work is recognised for blending traditional cultural influences with bold contemporary expression, creating art that resonates across communities, generations and audiences around the world.

NAIDOC 2026 THEME — 50 YEARS OF DEADLY

For five decades, NAIDOC Week has celebrated the voices of our communities — steady, unapologetic and proud. Each year, its themes have called for truth, celebrated culture, honoured resistance and reminded the nation of who we are.

"Fifty Years of Deadly" marks a milestone. It's a tribute to the people who built this movement: the Elders who stood firm, the organisers who made space, the artists who turned resistance into expression and the communities who keep showing up, year after year.

NAIDOC has always been more than a week — it's a platform, a protest, a celebration and a statement of survival. This moment is about looking back at the stories, the marches, the languages, the art,

the leadership. At the strength it took to get here. It's about recognising how far we've come, not by chance, but because generations of people refused to be silenced.

It's also about the here and now, who we are today. Grounded in culture. Strong in our identity. Leading change across every field, from health and education to media, business and the arts. We're telling our own stories, in our own way, on our own terms. And it's about the future. The next 50 years. The young ones growing up proud. The return of language. The return to Country. The fight for justice continuing with new tools, new voices and the same fire.

CURRICULUM RESOURCES – Journey through the decades



TIMELINE

1970s

- 1970** The first Aboriginal Legal Service (ALS) was established in Redfern, NSW.
- 1971** The Aboriginal Medical Service (AMS) in Redfern became the first Aboriginal community-controlled health service.
- 1971** Neville Bonner became Australia's first Aboriginal parliamentarian.
- 1972** The Aboriginal Tent Embassy was established in Canberra, ACT.
- 1972** The NSW Department of Education was no longer allowed to refuse Aboriginal students entry to public schools.
- 1975** Australia's first federal anti-discrimination law was passed: the Racial Discrimination Act.
- 1975** The World Council of Indigenous Peoples was founded.
- 1975** The Gurindji people, led by Vincent Lingiari, regained ownership of part of their traditional lands in the Northern Territory.
- 1976** Australia's first Aboriginal Land Rights Act was passed, the Aboriginal Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act 1976.
- 1977** The first United Nations meeting of Indigenous peoples was held in Geneva, Switzerland.
- 1978** The Anti-Discrimination Board strongly recommended that Aboriginal Studies be taught in schools as both a subject and a perspective to reduce prejudice and racial hostility.

1980s

- 1982** The NSW Aboriginal Education Policy became Australia's first Aboriginal-focused education policy.
- 1983** The Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 was passed in NSW.
- 1983** NT welfare legislation prioritised the placement of Aboriginal children with Aboriginal families and communities when adoption or fostering was necessary. NSW introduced their Children (Care and Protection) Act in 1987.
- 1985** Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park was returned to the Anangu people.
- 1985** The Torres Strait Treaty came into effect.
- 1987** The Royal Commission into Aboriginal Deaths in Custody began.
- 1988** The Bicentenary protest took place on 26 January at Sydney Harbour, NSW.
- 1989** The National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Education Policy was launched.

1990s

- 1991** The final report of the Royal Commission into Aboriginal Deaths in Custody (RCIADIC) was handed down.
- 1992** The High Court of Australia handed down the Mabo v Queensland (No 2) decision.
- 1993** The Native Title Act 1993 was passed.
- 1995** Tasmania passed its first legislation to legally recognise Aboriginal rights: the Aboriginal Lands Act 1995.
- 1995** The Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission launched an inquiry into the Stolen Generations.
- 1996** National Reconciliation Week began.
- 1997** The Bringing Them Home report was released.

2000s

2000 More than 250,000 people participated in the Walk for Reconciliation across the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

2001 A national conference on reparations for the Stolen Generations was held.

2007 The Northern Territory Intervention was launched by Prime Minister John Howard.

2008 The Apology to the Stolen Generations was delivered by Prime Minister Kevin Rudd.

2010s

2010 The National Congress of Australia's First Peoples was established.

2012 Reconciliation Australia's "Recognise" campaign began.

2014 The Poruma (Coconut Island) community protested for action on the Poruma Seawall Project.

2017 The Uluru Statement from the Heart was released.

2018 Victoria became the first Australian state to pass treaty legislation: the Advancing the Treaty Process with Aboriginal Victorians Act 2018.

2020s

2020 Black Lives Matter protests sparked global action, including rallies across Australia highlighting Indigenous deaths.

2020 Mining company Rio Tinto destroyed two 46,000-year-old Aboriginal heritage sites at Juukan Gorge in the Pilbara, WA.

2021 The Yoorrook Justice Commission was established in Victoria.

2023 The Voice to Parliament Referendum was defeated.

2023 South Australia's First Nations Voice Act was passed.

2023 Queensland passed the Path to Treaty Act 2023.

2024 Queensland established its Truth-telling and Healing Inquiry.

2024 Queensland repealed the Path to Treaty Act and ended the Truth-telling and Healing Inquiry.

2025 NAIDOC Week marked 50 years since it became a week-long national event in 1975.

This timeline is not intended to be an exhaustive list. It highlights some key moments found throughout this resource and is linked to NAIDOC themes at a national level, over the last 50 years.

Teachers and educators are encouraged to use key moments from their local community as often as possible.

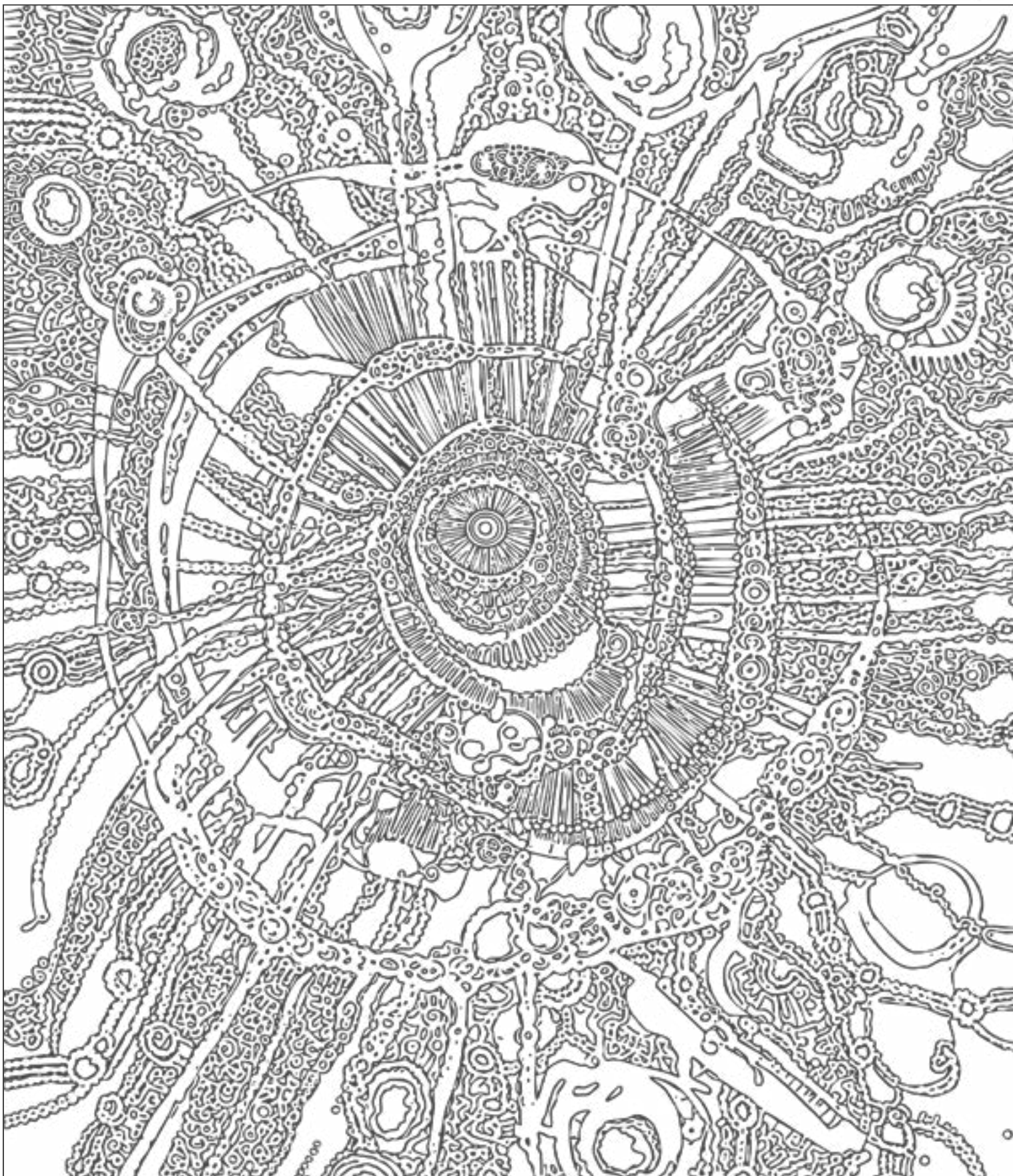

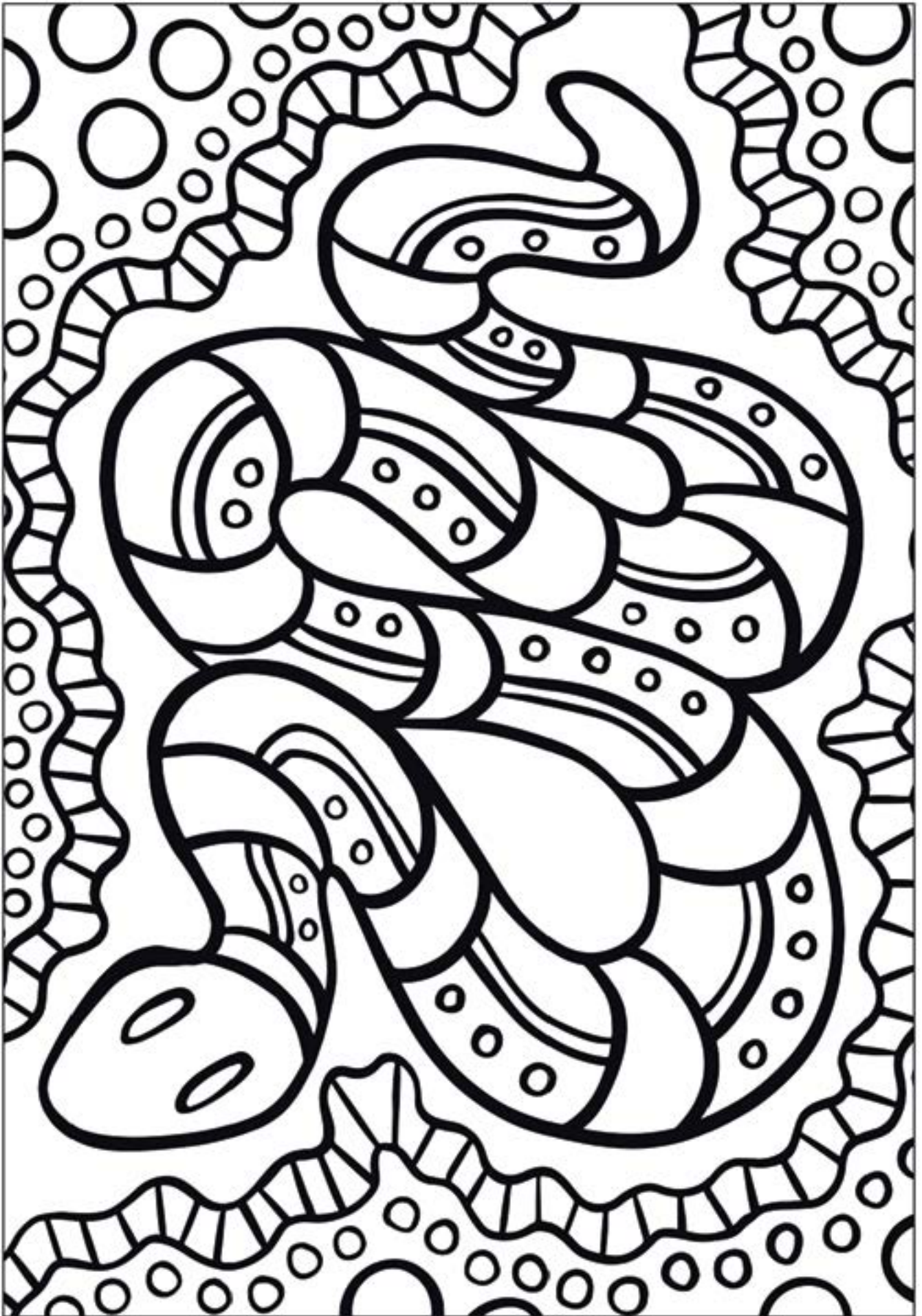

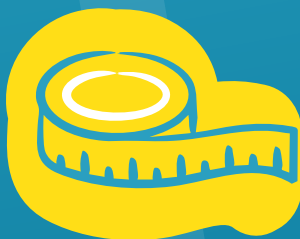

SPEEDY

STUFFED POTATO

Prep time: 5 minutes
Cook time: 8 minutes
Servings: 2



Ingredients

- ▲ 2 medium potatoes
- ▲ 400 g can black beans or kidney beans, drained and rinsed
- ▲ ½ cup frozen corn
- ▲ 4 tbs salsa
- ▲ ⅓ cup cheese, grated
- ▲ 2 tbs plain yoghurt
- ▲ Optional extras: fresh coriander, pickled jalapenos, chili flakes

Method

1. Wash potatoes and prick all over with a fork. Microwave on HIGH for 3 minutes, then flip and microwave for another 3 minutes, till soft. Be careful, the steam will burn!
2. While potato is cooking, drain the kidney beans in a colander and add the frozen corn. Use hot water to defrost the corn and rinse the beans at the same time.
3. Cut an X into the potato, not cutting all the way through. Use a fork to mash the centre a bit and make room for the toppings.
4. Load with corn, beans, salsa and cheese. Microwave for 1-2 minutes on HIGH to warm the fillings and melt the cheese.
5. Top with a dollop of yoghurt and any optional extras.

Variation

Add or swap in other chopped veggies like tomato, red onion or capsicum.

PREPARE AND PLAN FOR THE UNEXPECTED

Contingency planning can avoid further stress.



BE AWARE OF THE RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH BEHAVIOURS OR COPING STRATEGIES THAT ARE UNSAFE AND PUT YOURSELF AND OTHERS AT RISK

Unsafe alcohol consumption, misuse of prescription medication and use of illicit drugs.



TAKE TIME TO PAUSE, BREATHE AND REFLECT

A simple moment of reflection helps us connect our minds with our feelings. It enables us to connect what's happening around us with what's going on in our heads and hearts. Taking the time to ask the right questions of ourselves, and time to get a thoughtful answer, gives us perspective, direction and clarity. By taking time to pause and slow down our breathing (deep circular breaths), we slow down a racing heart, reducing the symptoms of stress headaches and muscle tension.
